Garden Oaks Civic Club Minutes

Tuesday, May 7, 2024 @ Great Heights Brewing

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 pm by President Mike Stephens.

A motion to accept the minutes from the April 2024 meeting was made, seconded, and approved.

President Mike Stephens briefly discussed the upcoming meeting with Council Member Abbie Kamin's office to review various community issues and solicited input for any topics of interest. One attendee requested mention of the ongoing water drainage issue at Graham Park after heavy rainstorms.

Mike mentioned that the old Sears property demolition work may start in a few months. Council Member Mario Castillo's office and HPD worked with the property developer to get a fence installed around the perimeter to improve safety until the demolition begins.

Treasure Brian Rabe presented a revised budget proposal for 2024 based on analysis to date. The main changes were

to adjust budgets for Signage and Beautification, and to proportionally allocate costs to the Constable program. The revised budget will be voted on at the June meeting. Mike also informed that GOCC will go after funding available for Beautification from the city, with support from both the council members. There was a brief discussion on other ways to raise funds and provide more visibility to promote the value of the Civic Club.

Constable chair Terry Jeanes mentioned that more Constable Supporter yard signs are available, and to reach out to her if you need a new sign or have suggestions for security enhancements.

Social chair Emily Stephens reported on the various successful events that took place in April. Over 40 houses participated in the Garage sale. A record \$4,000 was raised for the Constable Program with the Wakefield Shuffle. Other successful events in April included the Pollinator Event,

hosted by the Garden Club, the Earth Day Extravaganza, hosted by GO Kids, and the annual GOMM pancake breakfast fundraiser.

Upcoming events include the July 4th parade as well as several GO Kids ideas under consideration. Planning is about to begin for our next Constable Fundraiser, the annual Azalea Street Beer & Wine Extravaganza, in October.

Anna Smith, External Affairs Coordinator for CM Abbie Kamin, listed some of the issues being pursued including high water bills, drainage etc., as well as holding a Families with Pride event at Discovery Green on June 1.

Russell Etherton, Chief of Staff for CM Mario Castillo, listed their various engagements including Budget and Fiscal discussion townhalls, addition of speed bumps in various neighborhoods, and an effort to simplify the process of making vacant buildings safer. Nick Sweetland with CenterPoint Energy (CPE) gave a presentation to address the unusually frequent power outages in our neighborhood. He highlighted the various factors

considered by the company for power management such as load inspection, reliability, vegetation management, resiliency, and cyber security, among others. After the presentation there were several questions and concerns about the high number of outages and the lack of responsiveness and vegetation management from CPE. Nick took note of all the concerns and mentioned that this first meeting's primary objective was to capture all the concerns and take them back to his management team to address. He conveyed that he and his team are now focused on improving the reliability in the Garden Oaks area, and several of the issues raised are planned to be addressed in the next three months. He also requested that residents should forward any concerns and issues they would like to raise to Mike (president@gardenoaks.org), who will then consolidate them and forward them to Nick. CPE plans to attend future GOCC meetings and will bring representatives from other CPE groups to continue the power management discussions.

The meeting adjourned at 8:40 PM with the raffle gift card drawing which was donated by GOCC and won by Section 4 resident, Betsy Stein.



Texas Peach Season is Here!

Beginning in late spring, Texas peaches come on the scene, and their ripe, succulent juiciness can be enjoyed into early fall, usually until Labor Day. Peach season is one of my wfavorite things about living in Texas (besides being in Garden Oaks, of course!). From the famous Fredericksburg peaches to varieties grown in East Texas and the Rio Grande Valley, Texas freestone peaches set the national standard for sweetness, though most of them are consumed locally, right here in Texas.

The best time to go peach picking in Texas is in June or July, for maximum ripeness and those easy-eating freestone varieties everyone loves. Texas peaches can also be found at your local farmer's markets and even occasionally in grocery stores during peak season, especially in Texas-based HEB stores.

Whether you buy them from a roadside stand on a Hill Country trip or pick them up on your way home from work, once you've got your peaches in hand, ripeness is key. Peaches are one fruit that continues to ripen after it's picked, so don't worry if the ones you've found are still a little firm. The easiest method is simply to leave peaches on the counter. Peaches are best stored on their shoulders (not their bottoms) and separated so that they are not touching one another. To speed up the process, you can put the peaches in a paper bag to trap ethylene gas and hasten the ripening process. At Plonk! Bistro, where we serve peaches throughout Texas peach season, we ripen our peaches in our temperature and humidity controlled wine cellar. We find the slow ripening that happens in the wine cellar gives us the sweetest fruit.

Once your peaches are ripe, with a slightly soft but not mushy texture, you're ready to go! They're perfect for eating out of hand and also for classic peach desserts like Peach Cobbler, or Peach Ice Cream. And don't forget savory applications for Texas peaches! At Plonk!, we like to serve Texas peaches wrapped in salty, thinly sliced prosciutto and topped with a drizzle of honey and some fresh basil. We also like tossing them in salads and on pizzas for a sweet and savory flavor profile.


July 4th Parade Emily Stephens, Social Chair

Keep Off the Grass: Maintaining Your A/C System's Condenser *Mitch Weigand*

Here in Texas, we have definitely had our fair share of rain this year. One of the results of this precipitation is a very lush lawn. While it looks great, your lawn grows and needs to be cut frequently. As a result, your A/C system's condenser (the outside unit) can suffer.

That sweet smell of summer

Along with dust, pollen and leaves, grass clippings can seriously impede the flow of air that's essential to proper cooling. Grass clippings acts like a cover, constricting air flow into the condenser that is needed in order to cool your home. The result is that your A/C system works harder and harder and eventually fails. This means hot, sweaty nights for you during the peak of summer while you wait for your A/C service technician to make it to your home. Plus a \$3,500 repair bill to replace the condenser, and there goes the family summer vacation fund.

Preventative maintenance is the key

Avoid blowing grass clippings toward the condenser when mowing your lawn. After mowing, take your garden hose and spray thoroughly about six inches from the condenser's fins to clear them off.

Another way to make sure the condenser remains clear is every time you change your air filter inside your home, spend a few minutes outside and rinse the accumulated grass clippings, dust, and debris from your condenser with a garden hose. These simple steps can save you money and headaches in the future.

Just a friendly reminder now that we are in thunderstorm and hurricane season

During a thunderstorm, turn off your air conditioner at the thermostat. During a hurricane, make sure it's completely off, both at the thermostat and the circuit breaker in your electric panel. In the event of flooding, power to the A/C system can create a fire hazard or electrical shock.
