Garden Oaks Civic Club Minutes

Tuesday, June 4, 2024 @ Great Heights Brewing

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 pm by President Mike Stephens.

The minutes from the May 2024 meeting were approved.

Mike briefly discussed the ongoing goal to increase the current membership count of over 200 households. The significant local damage and long power outage due to the May 16 derecho was the next topic. Council Member Kamin's and Castillo's offices have offered to help anyone in need due to the storm.

A motion was made to approve the revised 2024 budget presented at the May meeting. The motion was seconded, and the revised budget was unanimously approved.

Treasure Brian Rabe presented the Treasurer's report and clarified that the budget was on track and the deficit was per plan.

Constable chair Terry Jeanes mentioned that Deputy Kelly will be participating in the July 4th parade.

Social chair Emily Stephens reported on the upcoming July 4th parade. The Azalea St. Beer and Wine fundraiser will be in October and help from volunteers on that day will be needed and appreciated. The event is the biggest fund raiser for the Constable program. Our single deputy contract costs around \$94,000 annually. It was mentioned that GOMO may be able to once again fund part of the program once it is up and running.

Russell Etherton from Councilman Mario Castillo's office discussed their effort to raise money to help seniors with storm damage, tree debris removal status and the associated high volume of incoming requests. He encouraged continued calls to 311 to request debris removal. A member from State Representative Penny Morales Shaw also offered to contact her office for help as needed.

GOCC Beautification Committee Chair Pam Parks presented the group's various responsibilities. The unique nature of Garden Oaks with curvy and narrower than normal streets and bigger right of ways (ROWs) lends itself to various pockets of parks in our neighborhood including 6 adopted ROWs with an area of over 2 acres, and 4 unadopted ROWs. The committee helps take care of mowing and maintenance of these ROWs while the city pays for the watering. The general philosophy is to support a wide range of styles and move towards native and pollinator plans to conserve water. Most parks have a Park Captain responsible for organizing workdays and for fundraising for the bed maintenance and mowing contracts. Other efforts undertaken by the Committee include branding support with pillars and entrance signs. Maps of this branding effort and the presentation itself will be available on the GOCC web site.

Mike thanked Pam for the tremendous passion she brings to the management of the community parks and the web site.

The meeting adjourned at 8:35 PM with the announcement that there will not be a July meeting.

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Beat the Heat with Summer Sangria!

A signature sangria recipe is a great way to set your summer backyard or pool party apart from the rest! A crisp glass of white wine or light bodied red wine can be refreshing on a warm day, but sometimes an additional fruity kick and glass full of ice is needed to beat the heat.

Experimentation is the key to discovering your own signature sangria recipe. While you're following your inspiration, here are some things you might keep in mind, based on my experience making sangria at Plonk! Bistro:

- Good sangria generally starts with a good wine choose something you would drink on its own. I generally choose light-bodied reds and fruit forward whites, but try your favorites and find the right signature bottle for your soon-to-be-famous sangria.
- Simple syrup is an easy to make sweetener that works well for sangria. I prepare simple syrup with a one-to-one ratio one part sugar, one part water. Just bring the water to a boil and dissolve the sugar, then allow the mixture to cool. This simple syrup will last in the fridge for up to a month. Simple syrup with a higher sugar content can last

even longer.

- The bitterness of orange peel can add a complexity that will complement your sangria. Oranges are a must have for all of my favorite versions of sangria, both red and white. Wash the oranges, remove any stickers from the grocery store, but don't peel them. Cut them into 1-inch chunks and add them to the sangria, peel and all.
- Red or white wine may make up the base of your sangria, but other ingredients, like dessert wines, fortified wines, or even liqueurs can add a little booziness and bring additional flavor. At Plonk! Bistro, Sauterne is a favorite for white sangria, and a ruby port makes our red sangria richer and more flavorful.
- Mix and match fruit depending on what's available, well priced, of good quality, and in season. Plum is a great addition to a red sangria, while nectarine or peaches work well in white. Berries are always a nice choice, and blueberries are my favorite for their ability to impart flavor and color while holding their shape.

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State Farm, Bloomington, IL

- Let the fruit sit in the wine mixture, refrigerated, for at least 8 hours. You can adjust the flavor after soaking the fruit and before serving. Is your sangria too sweet? Add more acid, like lemon or lime juice, or pour in a little more wine. Too bitter or tart? Add a little more simple syrup or orange juice.
- Serving your sangria with cut fruit inside the glass makes a beautiful visual presentation, but if you'd like to extend the shelf life of your sangria, strain out the fruit and store the sangria in an air-tight container. Stored this way, sangria can last several days, so prep extra for a refreshing pick-me-up any day of the week!

Plonk! White Sangria (my go-to recipe during Texas Peach Season)

1 bottle dry white wine

1 cup chopped, peeled ripe Texas Peaches

1 cup blueberries, chopped or cut in half

1 orange, cut into 1-inch chunks, including the peel

1/3 cup dessert wine (Sauternes, Semillon, or Moscato)

1/3 cup simple syrup (1:1 ratio)


1/3 cup fresh squeezed orange juice

2 Tablespoons lemon juice

1 Tablespoon lime juice

Combine ingredients and store in the refrigerator for 8 hours or overnight. Strain if desired, or serve with fruit over ice and garnish with fresh orange slices.

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Choosing a Home Generator: Portable vs. Stand-by

Part One of Three Mitch Weigand

During every hurricane season, many people want to know my thoughts on purchasing a generator. Let's review both types of generators available along with their pros and cons.

Home generators are designed to handle power outages. They run on a variety of fuels such as gasoline, diesel, natural gas (NG) and propane. At the very least, the generator should have enough capacity to run your refrigerator, a couple of lamps and fans, plus any special medical equipment required by a family member.

A portable generator may be the answer

The most economical way to supply emergency electricity is a portable generator which will create enough wattage to fit your needs. The smallest generator for household use should supply at least 4,000 watts (4 kilowatts) of power. That size could probably run a refrigerator, a fan, one light and perhaps your TV.

Portable generators are powered by gasoline or a propane tank – the same type used for large outdoor grills. Propane can be a good choice because gas stations are often closed down immediately after a hurricane, and you have to use a fuel stabilizer to help maintain stored gasoline that sits around for a long time. Propane

is much more stable and does not require any additives.

A portable generator is a lot like a lawn mower. They are started by pulling a cord, and one very important consideration is how many people in your household have the strength and skill to start it. Portable generators also produce pollution – both air and noise.

Please note that NO portable generator should be operated inside or near windows, doors or any other area that could allow deadly fumes such as carbon monoxide to seep into your home. A suggested safe distance is at least 10 feet away. Heavy-duty extension cords will have to be run from the generator into the house to power your chosen appliances.

What is the price range? For many homeowners, this is the starting point. Prices range from about \$350 for an economical, no-name model that produces 4,000-watts to \$2,000 for an 8,000-watt, top-end unit. They can be purchased online, many with free shipping, or at any big-box hardware store.
