It's July 15th, and I'm thinking about what I might write for the August issue of the Gazette. I'm looking in the mirror at the T-Shirt I'm wearing, which shows a half full glass of water with the caption "Half Full". I get comments about the T-Shirt all the time when I'm out and about. "I like that shirt! Stay positive!"

It's certainly a tough time to stay positive in Houston. Our standard summer weather has set in, with daily heat indexes at 100+degF. We've endured two crushing storms in two months. At the time of writing this article, many of us are still without power, seven days after Hurricane Beryl.

When trying to draw positives from the current situation, what immediately comes to mind is the incredible group of neighbors who surround me and my family. I trust that most of you can make the same claim. It's a strength of Garden Oaks: pride in our neighborhood and care for our neighbors.

When trees came down on my block, the area was swarming with neighbors, with chainsaws in hand, wanting to help. When power was out for an extended period of time, extension cords ran in all directions from generators, and people stuffed operating refrigerators and freezers with as much as they could take in from others. Cell phone texts strings were created for wellness checks amongst adjacent neighbors, and other friends throughout Garden Oaks. Some of you have heard me say this multiple times in the past, but I've lived in a few other large cities in the U.S. over the years and Garden Oaks is, by far, the most supportive and friendly group of neighbors I've ever had.

The mission of the Garden Oaks Civic Club (GOCC) is to promote neighborhood unity, which in turn strengthens our community. Even in the heat of summer, our streets are full of families, and couples out for a walk and stopping for conversations with neighbors. Our July 4th parade had families on bicycles, and families pushing strollers that easily filled an entire block in the heart of Garden Oaks. Our community events, such as the Azalea Street Extravaganza (more to come on that soon!), are hugely attended and raise thousands of dollars to fund things like our Constable program. We watch for our local businesses, many of which have owners who are also Garden Oaks residents, to recover from the storm and we quickly try to stop in for a beer, a meal, or to shop, as a show of support.

Representatives from the two Houston City Council Districts that represent sections of Garden Oaks attend almost every monthly GOCC meeting. Those same representatives, and most recently the Council Members themselves, have checked in with GOCC officers on the status of the neighborhood and provided updates, to the best of their knowledge, on recovery efforts. They also helped escalate concerns to CenterPoint about the widespread outages in Garden Oaks, and the appearance of a lack of immediate repair response. I encourage all of you to attend our monthly GOCC meetings and meet your City Council representatives personally. For those of you who attended GOCC monthly meetings this spring, you heard from local residents who have established direct communications with the CenterPoint Service Area Manager who is assigned to Garden Oaks, and we also saw a presentation from a CenterPoint representative. Interesting timing, right before some of the most impactful power outages for our neighborhood in years.

Pro Tips for Keeping Perishable Food Safe During a Power Outage Kala Dunn, Garden Oaks Resident

Hurricane Beryl recently challenged both home cooks and chefs across Garden Oaks and the whole city with extended power outages. In some restaurants and homes, loss of food due to unsafe temperatures led to financial hardship, inconvenience, and frustration. Having experienced several extended power outages as a chef, I wanted to share a few tips that might be useful as we move through the rest of the hurricane season.

Determining What's Safe to Consume after a Power Outage

• Make sure you have appliance thermometers in your refrigerator and freezer. These thermometers can tell you the air temperature in your refrigerator and freezer. Check to ensure that the freezer temperature is at or below 0°F and the refrigerator is at or below 40°F.

• The air temperature will steadily climb during the power outage, and items inside the refrigerator and freezer will thaw and/or warm up at different rates, depending on

the size, shape, and material of the container, the water content and consistency of the food, and other variables. If you want to get scientific about it, you can use a **digital thermometer** to check the temperature of individual items inside the refrigerator. You may find that a large container of leftover soup is still cold even after smaller items, or food stored in shallower containers, have exceeded the safe temperature of **40°F** for more than two hours, at which point the food should be discarded.

• However, do not open the doors of the refrigerator and freezer frequently. Most refrigerators will hold a very cold temperature for at least four hours, depending on the ambient room temperature. After that point, you may want to begin checking temperatures hourly or transfer food to a cooler.

• Perishable foods that were kept above 40°F for 2 hours or more (or 1 hour if temperatures are above 90°F) should be discarded.

• However, many factors influence how perishable foods are. Foods with low water content, high acidity, or that contain preservatives like salt, sugar, and nitrates, can withstand more temperature abuse without spoilage or excessive pathogen growth. If the power goes out, and the food in the refrigerator warms before you are able to move it to a cooler, you may need to throw some items away, like raw meat or leftovers, but your condiments, which are generally high in acidity and preservatives, may be fine. Hard cheeses are safer for longer than soft cheeses because of their lower water content. Whole vegetables, fruits and berries can be visually examined to determine their quality. Discard foods that have changed in appearance or odor, and check expiration dates – any item that was on its "last legs," so to speak, will only become more suspect as the temperature rises.

• If a thermometer has not been kept in the freezer, **check each package** of food to determine its safety. If the food **still contains ice crystals** or is **40°F** or below, it is safe to refreeze or cook.

Preparing for a Power Outage

• Purchase or make ice cubes in advance, and freeze gel packs and containers of water to help keep the temperature inside the freezer or refrigerator down. This ice can even be transferred to coolers later to store food after the refrigerator is no longer a viable option. The frozen containers of water can also provide clean drinking water during the emergency.

• Freeze refrigerated items that can be frozen or are not needed immediately, such as leftovers or fresh meat and poultry. Freezing items ahead of time keeps them at a safe temperature longer.

• Group food together in the freezer. This helps the food stay cold longer, especially if the freezer is not very full. A full freezer or refrigerator stays cold longer, but you're better off stocking up on non-perishables rather than filling your freezer before a storm. Grouping food together helps keep what you've got colder for longer!

• As a general rule, food in the refrigerator will be cold for about four hours if unopened, and a full freezer will keep the temperature for approximately 48 hours (24 hours if it is half full) if the door remains closed. • Have coolers on hand to keep refrigerated food cold if the power might be out for more than 4 hours.

Losing food to a power outage is never a good feeling, and there's a lot you can do to limit your losses in this situation. However, remember that food safety is very important, and a case of food poisoning could make a difficult situation even more unpleasant, so remember the old saying, "When it doubt, throw it out!"

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

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Choosing a Home Generator: Portable vs. Stand-by Part Two of Three

Last month we discussed the possibility of choosing a portable generator. The pros for this kind of generator can be found in its name. It's portable so you can use it while camping, operating power tools outside, or after a weather emergency when electricity is temporarily unavailable. Another plus is that portable generators use a variety of fuel, with propane being the most convenient and easiest to obtain.

What are the cons? Well, it creates a lot of noise while running, and the fumes can be toxic. A portable generator also requires constant monitoring and fuel refilling.

Let's now examine our other choice.

What is an automatic stand-by generator?

An automatic stand-by generator is a back-up electrical system which operates whether you are home or away. It literally stands at the ready, and within seconds of an electrical outage, automatically supplies power directly to your home's circuit breaker box. Once electricity is restored, the generator shuts itself off and waits for the next outage.

Stand-by generators operate on natural gas or liquid propane (LP)

gas and sit in the yard just like your central A/C system's outside condenser.

The American Red Cross recommends the stand-by generator over a portable generator as the superior method to provide back-up power to your home. Here's why:

1. With a properly installed stand-by generator, your home is free of potentially deadly carbon monoxide that a portable generator emits.

2. Using your home's natural gas fuel supply, it's less expensive to run than gasoline in a portable generator and does not need to be refilled constantly.

3. It eliminates the hassle of hauling a portable generator outside or running extension cords throughout your home.

Whether you're at home or away, a stand-by generator starts automatically within seconds of a power outage. Stand-by generators provide protection 24/7 and turn themselves off when utility power is restored.
