Beryl's Lemons....to Lemonade *Tina Rowe, Section 1 resident*

When Hurricane Beryl gives you lemons, you make lemonade. That's exactly what two Garden Oaks families did. A lightning strike during Beryl caused irreversible damage to a 40+ foot oak tree that sat on their shared property line. These neighbors didn't let the damaged tree sour their spirits. Instead, they collaborated and turned the tree into something positive and desirable.

Their partnership led them to hire Jim Phillips. Jim carved most of the famous Galveston sculptures after Hurricane lke devastated many trees in 2008. They met with him, sketched a design and then started the process of turning their tree trunk into a masterpiece. Phillips' work can be seen all over Texas and now proudly in Garden Oaks.

John and Gina Greenslate and LizBeth Saracho, Garden Oaks Section 1 residents, let their creative juices flow and their design concept grew. They wanted a sculpture that blended in with the neighborhood, was imaginative, and one that could be seen and enjoyed by neighbors, children and passersby from all directions. Since Gina loves gardening, the garden gnome sitting atop a mushroom was born. In Gina's own words, "Gnomes are whimsical dwellers of the earth, helpful garden protectors, and generally cheerful, so it fit naturally in the landscape."

Fitting naturally into the landscape is exactly what this beautiful tree sculpture does. It sits close to the street, and when you pass by, you will also see flowers, a butterfly, a dragonfly and my favorite, the squirrel. The sculpture is located at 507 W. 32nd St. It has already brought the neighborhood so much joy. Response has been overwhelmingly positive and put smiles on many faces.

And in case you are wondering, like I was, the gnome has a name. He is named "Gnomy" in honor of the Greenslate's late dog, Romy.

Garden Oaks Civic Club Minutes Deepak Khosla, GOCC Secretary

Tuesday, September 3, 2024 @ Great Heights Brewing

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 pm by Vice President Paul Vincent.

Paul welcomed Barry Ward, the Executive Director of Trees of Houston. Trees of Houston is now the largest regional tree planting organization in North America.

Barry provided a brief overview of his organization's goals and accomplishments, such as distributing over 100,000 trees on a \$4M budget. He mentioned the important things we need to do to take care of trees, including the three 'R's: Right Tree, Right Location, Regular Maintenance. He strongly recommended getting an arborist to look at our trees. A list of certified Arborists can be found at the International Society of Arboriculture web site - https://www.isa-arbor.com/. He also suggested planting only short trees near power lines to minimize impact of storms. A suggested list of trees for our area can be obtained by emailing Barry at barry@ treesforhouston.org.

Anna Smith, external coordinator from Council Member Abbie Kamin's office, provided updates on efforts to help families recovering from Beryl, including getting refunds and speeding up storm debris cleanup, and also provided details of the Families with Pride event being sponsored by her office on October 26.

Russell Etherton from Councilman Mario Castillo's office mentioned their upcoming activities including a tree giveaway at Shepherd Park, a Spay & Neuter event, and a survey for district residents.

Christina Walsh, liaison for State Representative Penny Morales, handed out their newsletter and mentioned that her office was also pursuing Centerpoint on its handling of Beryl.

A motion to accept the minutes from the August 2024 meeting was made, seconded, and approved.

Paul next discussed the upcoming Azalea Street Beer and Wine Extravaganza on November 16th. Tickets are available online using the QR code on the front page of the Gazette or the GOCC web site. Early bird pricing ends October 15th.

Paul also reported good progress on PTO meetings to offer our support and is looking for volunteers to help liaison with these groups. The upcoming National Night Out is on October 1, and everyone is encouraged to meet neighbors and spread the good work being done by GOCC. There will not be a GOCC meeting in October.

Paul discussed the formation of a committee to recruit candidates for GOCC officer positions for 2025. Members are encouraged to volunteer or nominate someone for each of the office positions. Candidates will be presented in November and voted on at the December meeting.

The \$25 raffle gift card, graciously donated by Darlene's Flowers & Gifts, was won by Section 1 resident David Fuentes.

Treasurer Brian Rabe presented the Treasure's report and mentioned that the club is working with both District Council members in applying forasav Department of Neighborhood grant.

GO Creature Report: Gulf Coast Toad Sophie Crow and Bernada Rubasingham, Garden Oaks Residents

After a steady downpour in the warmer months, the quest to locate and 'rescue' toads begins. In the evenings, they come out of their burrows and can be found sitting casually on the easements or in ditches of Section 4. Some carefree toads will venture off onto the road, in an attempt to soak in the warmth. With some gentle encouragement they can be convinced to hop back to safety. For the occasional stubborn toad for whom the warmth is too irresistible, our brave and experienced neighbor, Ms. Catalina, will carefully scoop them up and move them. Creature Details:

The Gulf Coast toad is a species of toad that roams most of North America and Mexico. They come in brown, black, or yellow colors. Their diet mainly consists of almost any small arthropod it can swallow. On average they can live three to five years. Some of the only animals that will eat a gulf coast toad are birds and snakes. They usually make a loud "AUK" sound. They are not picky with habitats, which range from forests to urban areas.

Status: Least Concern by the IUCN Red List and has a NatureServe Global Conservation Status Rank of G5 (Secure). This is because they have a wide distribution, a large population, and can tolerate a variety of habitats.

Difference between Frogs and Toads:

1. Toads have thicker or bumpy skin while frogs have smooth or slimy skin

2. Toads spend most of their time on land while frogs spend most of their time in water

Protecting Your Air Conditioning System's Capacitors

Previously, we discussed how to protect your A/C system during thunderstorms: when you hear thunder from an approaching storm, turn your A/C off. This helps protect it from power surges. Nearly 90% of all electrical-related damage occurs when your A/C is left on during thunderstorms. You are protecting your system's capacitors.

So what exactly is a capacitor?

A capacitor is an electrical device that stores an electrical charge. In A/C systems, they are used to turn on fan motors and compressors. Other motors such as an electric car engine, furnace, spa pump, and home generator have them too. Pretty much any motor that uses electricity to function has a capacitor or two built into it.

In A/C systems, capacitors come in two types: (1) start capacitors and (2) run capacitors. Start capacitors do just that - they start a motor. Start capacitors provide extra torque (power boost) at the start-up for the compressor. An internal relay automatically disconnects them from the compressor once the compressor starts.

Run capacitors are designed to keep the compressor running continuously while it is being powered. They maintain a relatively constant voltage supply to the compressor.

Think of them as an internal surge protector Because both capacitors involve electricity, they are susceptible to power surges which can occur during/after thunderstorms. Some have an interrupter, which causes them to fail before internal pressure causes serious damage to your A/C system. Another design causes the top of the capacitor to expand and break its internal wiring.

Over many years of use, the capacitor's strength reduces and it simply wears out. Then, the A/C motor may fail to start or run at full power. If a motor is running during a lightning strike along the power grid, the run capacitor might be damaged or weakened by a voltage spike, thus requiring replacement.

So when there's electricity in the air, turn your A/C off. Additionally, if there is a power outage, wait 20 minutes after power is restored to turn your air conditioner back on.
