## Can you Help the Monarchs?

Monarch Butterflies are a beautiful species that give us immense pleasure to watch them flitter about in our gardens. The Eastern Monarchs migrate through Texas on their way south to over winter in Mexico. It is important to help provide this wonderful species with food and host plants for them to lay their eggs and provide food for the hatched caterpillars. These "host plants" for Monarchs are milkweed plants. They are the only host plants for them. While they can feed upon other nectar bearing plants, the host plant is crucial to their survival.

The Beautification Committee and the Garden Club have decided to help expand the number of milkweed plants in our common areas. We are considering two planting areas on GO Blvd, an area in the Art Park, one at the Berm, the Rose Garden and also Friendship Park. We have based our selected locations on those having the right growing conditions for milkweed, mainly plenty of sunlight.

To implement this plan, we need to raise some money to help purchase the milkweed plants. We have a ballpark figure of about \$500.00. Donations can be made here: https://www.gardenoaks.org/memberships/ which links to the civic club payments page. In the box for Beautification put in the amount you want to give and add the word "butter-flies" in the field labeled "instructions".

If we raise more funds than we need for this event we will donate the extra funds to the Native Plant Society of Texas, Houston Chapter. This non-profit association aims to educate both its members and the public on the importance of native plants and to foster a greater awareness of the Texas native flora, and to encourage landscaping with appropriate native plants.

Keep an eye out for an announcement for a March Monarch Milkweed Planting event to help plant the milkweed in a pocket park nearest your home.



## Garden Oaks Civic Club Minutes

Tuesday, January 7, 2025 @ Great Heights Brewing

The meeting was called to order at 7:31 pm by President Mike Stephens.

A motion to accept the minutes from the December 2024 meeting was made, seconded, and approved.

A motion was made to nominate Bill Shaughnessy for the Civic Club Secretary position. The motion passed. There was much applause.

External Affairs Coordinator Anna Smith from City Council Member Abbie Kamin's office (District C) announced that the city council is working on a city-wide initiative report for the year 2025. Citizens are encouraged to report power Issues to the CM's office. They are looking for citizens' feedback on the problems with short-term rentals (AirBnb, Vrbo, etc), and have a feedback form available at houstontx.gov/ara. Solid waste pick-up problems are ongoing. For best

results, make a report to 311 AND email CM Kamin's office at districtc@houstontx.gov.

Russell Etherton from City Council Member Mario Castillo's office (District H) added that there will be 5 District H town hall events in 2025. The closest one to Garden Oaks will be at St. Rose of Lima Catholic Church on February 15th, from 10:00-11:30am. No updates on any plans at the site of the former Sears building.

HPD Officer Cabrera of the North Shepherd District Response Team gave a summary of the revitalized area bike patrol program. The bike patrol program will increase police visual presence around schools, parks, and retail centers by having bike mounted patrols across the area between US290 and US59. The Oak Forest Homeowners Association purchased 7 bikes at a cost of \$1000 per bike. A motion was made to reimburse OFHA for 1 of the bikes. The motion was seconded and approved by the voting members.

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Treasurer Brian Rabe reported that the budget deficit is as expected.

Beautification Chair Pam Parks confirmed that the parks have been winterized in advance for the upcoming potential freeze, including draining the irrigation systems. She also stated that there are several outstanding tree issues that need addressing, and that she has made requests to 311 concerning these issues. She has asked Mike to contact Council Members for higher level attention to the outstanding and overdue 311 items. An example is a limb that is dangling dangerously over the rose garden in Section 1.

Garden Oaks Maintenance Organization (GOMO) President Stuart Arouty gave an update on the re-establishment of GOMO. This would involve a modification of the deed restrictions, which could include a modernization of the language, removal of the racial prohibitions, garage size limitations, etc. The next meeting of GOMO will be on January 15th at St. Stephens United Methodist Church, 2003 W. 43rd Street. This meeting is the special annual meeting where new Board Members will be elected. All Garden Oaks residents are encouraged to attend.

James Elmore presented a map of all the homes in Garden Oaks showing which homes have supplied up-to-date contact information to the civic club and/or GOMO. In order to get out communication more efficiently, a drive is underway to get as many email addresses as possible. If anyone knows any neighbor who doesn't have their emails provided to the civic club, please try to get that information, or even walk door-to-door to get them.

Mike gave an update on the neighborhood signs that would be erected at the entrances to the subdivision. There is some grant money available through the city council offices that could help pay for a portion of the signage. The final design of the signs is almost complete.

Mike opened the floor to new business suggestions, 2025 goals, and asked for input for any speakers anyone knows of or might be interested in having at future meetings. Suggestions can be sent to president@gardenoaks.org.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:19PM.

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## Mickey's Minute Mickey Morales

Thirteen years, man! That's right at the time of this posting in mid-January, Farmer Cathy and I will be approaching the thirteenth year of our seemingly life-sentence for hosting The Farmstand on Wakefield drive. But as far as life sentences go, this is probably the best one you could possibly serve. I say this in jest of course, although there have been times when it has been quite challenging due to the weather, venue changes and personality differences.

Here's a thumbnail sketch of how this all came together. Cathy and I were original vendors at what is now the largest farmers market in Houston and became disenchanted with the direction it was heading. I was asked to organize and manage the Highland Village market and then in turn the City Centre market a few months later. Both of these endeavors were disappointing as well, being beholden to an entity that is used to dealing with businesses that sell goods with infinite shelf life rather than an emphasis on fresh foods.

So, Cathy and I decided to take our goods and talents

elsewhere. We started out as a ragtag affair on the corner of Golf and Wakefield in a rocky parking lot across from what used to be the Petrol Station and were supplanted by the Pengu Swim School. Then we moved to what is now Wakefield Crowbar as they built out and then moved to what is now Great Heights Brewing Company until their soft opening the week that Hurricane Harvey came to town. It was at that time that Rick Russell offered us our current home while I was hosting a couple of days of fundraising for our farmers who were flooded out, and we've been there ever since. There have been several renditions of the market including a few name changes and a long list of incubating vendors that now have brick and mortar locations. I even at one point bought everyone a brand-new white tent along with tables and chairs in order make a more cohesive destination for our customers to do their shopping and socializing.

Covid changed everything. We replaced all of the existing vendors who had gotten a little lackadaisical in their attendance and offerings, repopulating the market with vendors

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desperate to market wares in order to save their businesses and employees after the restaurants were all closed. One by one, all of these vendors went back to selling their goods to restaurants, down to what you see now. Now we just refer to the market as simply The Farmstand, because that's basically what it is; it's just not located on the county road that runs in front of Sullivan's Happy Heart Farm down in Damon, Texas.

All in all, it's been a hoot serving the good folks who have supported us through thick and thin no matter what number or type of vendors we had. The most gratifying thing has been watching your children grow up and go off to college. That includes Bella and Antonio who rode up on their bikes without their parents to get breakfast tacos. And also includes Sierra and Sophia making fairy castles out of rocks, mud and sticks on the fringes of the parking lot. and who are now off to college, with Sophia serving as our brave young entrepreneur through her sophomore and senior years of high school. And she still makes guest appearances when home on her school breaks.

As always, "Come soon, come often, and pray that we are never paroled.".

The Farmstand is located on Wakefield across from Great Heights Brewing and Decant Winery. It's open from 9-1 pm every Saturday, rain or shine. You can find fresh farm eggs, vegetables in season, and made to order breakfast tacos and omelettes.

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

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## The Spring Check: Think of It as Spring Cleaning for Your A/C Auggie Reyes, new owner of AirWise

Spring is finally on its way. Flowers are blooming, pollen is floating in the air (gesundheit!) and robins are returning from their winter homes. Spring also means that Summer will be here very soon and with it, the demand for air conditioning.

With the current mild temperatures and lower humidity, A/C may be the last thing on your mind. However, now is the perfect time to arrange for the annual Spring check for your A/C system. Think of it as a necessary task on your spring cleaning list!

#### Pump it up!

During the Spring check, inspecting your system's freon level and adding some as needed is the most important step. Being just one pound low of freon can increase your monthly electrical bill by nearly \$100! While replacing lost freon and repairing the leak that caused it will cost around \$300-\$450, it's sure a lot cheaper than replacing a burned-out compressor at \$3,500 or more.

#### What else is done during the Spring check?

OUTSIDE - Check start capacitor and potential relay. Check compressor contactor.

Check all wiring and connections. Check condensing coils. INSIDE - Check voltage and amperage to all motors with meters. Check air temperature drop across the evaporator coil. Check secondary drain pan. Lubricate all moving parts if available. Check and adjust thermostat. Check filters.
